Minister's Article

"The Welcome Table"

William Willimon, former bishop of the United Methodist Church and Dean of Duke University Chapel, once related the following story: I'm driving down a road in South Carolina and I pass a church with one of those sign boards out in front of the church. This sign read, "Repent! Now is the day of salvation!" Just down the road was a church of a different denomination from the first. It also had a sign out front. It proclaimed, "Happy Mother's Day. Virtues are learned at mother's knee, vices at some other joint." I thought to myself, "What does the world, that knows nothing of Christianity except for those signs, think about the Christian faith?"

Just down the road was another sign (I know what you're thinking, "Still more churches on this road?" I was thinking the same thing). This sign read, "We've got room for you at our table. Hospitality practiced here. Everyone welcome!" Nice thought, I said to myself. The church of the large table. Trouble was, I looked again as I drove past and noted that the sign was in front of the Shady Dale Restaurant, not a church. I really think, though, that the restaurant sign was far more appropriate for any of the churches than any of the signs they displayed themselves.

Over the centuries, the church has been at the forefront of division. There was the dispute over whether humanity has free will to choose salvation or whether salvation is predestined. There was the argument over whether the laity should be served the bread *and* cup during communion or merely bread alone. The official position of the clergy stated the laity would spill the cup (blood of Christ) and, since this would be sacrilege, they should be served only the bread. This dispute led (in part) to the Protestant Reformation. There was the division over whether women should be allowed to preach from the pulpit, or merely teach in Sunday School; and the debate through the mid-19th century as to whether it was God's will that light-skinned peoples own dark-skinned slaves or whether "all men are created equal." Yes, the church has – sadly – been at the forefront of division over the years.

Which is why it is good to remember the Pentecost story from Acts (chapter 2). We will hear it told as we celebrate Pentecost this Sunday. The nature and purpose of the church, seen clearly in the story of its birth, is to bring people together. The church was not formed until the believers had all come together in "one" place. Of course, the idea of "oneness" has to be re-imagined in an age of social distancing. But the "oneness" of the church can never be overcome by the transient, temporary things of this world — even global pandemics. Moreover, as the church was formed, it did so seeking to gather the known world to itself and to God. When we therefore — as church — realize the our nature and purpose is not compromised by our very real differences and the competition among us, but rather to gather ourselves to one another to God, we are born anew. Praise be to God!
