- Smoking
- COPD (Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease)
- Diabetes
- Heart Condition (possibly including high blood pressure?)
- Immunocompromised State from a Solid Organ Transplant
- Obesity (many people qualify for this if they have a BMI over 30, which isn't really very high).
- Pregnancy
- Pulmonary Disease
- Sickle Cell Disease

There is а site called vaccinefinder.org, and it lets you see what places are giving vaccinations. In Macon county there are 11 places! Krogers, Walmart, & Walgreens for sure. Stopping and Starting

One of my favorite "church stories" comes from the secretary who worked at First Christian Church in Centralia when I was pastor there. She was not a member of our congregation, but faithfully attended a Lutheran church in a nearby town. She also had 3 small grandchildren and gladly took them with her to worship anytime she had the chance. When she did, she would bring two things with her. First, a small baggie of cookies (in case the kids got restless). Second, a dollar bill for each of them to give at offering time. One Sunday, she told me later, her granddaughter was getting antsy and wiggly right around the offering time. She had already handed the child a dollar, which the girl clutched in one hand. To appease her and keep her quiet, she then handed her a cookie as well so that when the offering trays were passed, the child was holding both a cookie (in one hand) and a dollar bill (in the other). As the tray came to the secretary she held it in front of the child. Nothing happened. So she whispered (in what I can only imagine was a semi-aggressive tone), "Put it in the tray!" At which point the child looked nervously from one hand to the other and then... put the cookie in the offering tray!

I love this story as a simple reminder of how hard it is to give up something; something we love; something that makes us feel comfortable. And yet, as our story from scripture this past Sunday reminds us, letting go is necessary for our spiritual growth and development. In Mark 10:46-52 Jesus heals the blind man Bartimaeus. As Jesus calls Bartimaeus to him, Bartimaeus leaves behind his cloak and after he is healed, doesn't go back and retrieve it. Instead, he follows Jesus. That cloak represented Bartimaeus' old life as a blind beggar and in leaving it behind, Bartimaeus shows us that we cannot encounter Jesus without being changed; without changing something about our lives. And all change is based on letting go of one thing (as Bartimaeus did his cloak) so we can grab hold of something else (in Bartimaeus' case, the hand of Jesus). It is about starting to do something we haven't done before (or doing more of something we already are) and stopping to do something we currently do (or doing less of it).

As we continue our sermon series called "WWW." (where the Ws stand for Who we are, What we do and Why we do it), the story of Bartimaeus is an appropriate reminder that if we are going to share Christ more effectively with the wider world, we must be prepared to ask the following questions:

What is something we should <u>start</u> doing (or do <u>more</u> of)? What is something we could <u>stop</u> doing (or do <u>less</u> of)?

Our vision team is continuing to meet in order to prepare a strategic plan to present to the council and wider congregation for its approval. As it does, I know that we would love to hear your answers to these two questions. We have gathered your responses to the question from two weeks ago about how we can be more hospitable to "strangers" and will gladly add your responses to these questions to them.
