# Minister's Article

#### At the Crossroads

In John 15:1-8, Jesus compares himself to a vine and us to the branches of the vine. In so doing, he uses two more images to underscore the analogy: 1) bearing fruit and 2) "abiding." Our goal as branches of the vine is to bear fruit. This is not an uncommon image in the New Testament and this metaphor implies being faithful. Specifically in John's gospel it refers to exemplifying Jesus' own acts of love. The operative word here is "acts." To bear fruit is to show forth *actions* and not merely utter words. We remember, for example, how John the Baptist told the crowds (Matthew 3 and Luke 3) that they needed to *bear fruit* worthy of their repentance (and not merely speak words of repentance).

I've always understood the cross to be a compelling symbol for bearing fruit. The vertical beam of the cross signifies our relationship with God (with us at the bottom and God at top), while the horizontal beam signifies our love for our neighbors, who dwell on the same, lateral, earthly plane as we do. In this model we see the full meaning of the Great Commandment. We cannot have love of God (vertical) without love of neighbor (horizontal). It is not enough to experience love of God (vertical) without bearing fruit toward neighbor (horizontal).

I still think this is a valuable way to view the cross' symbolism. But in light of this passage from John 15, I find myself focusing on the cross in a different way thanks to a shift from "bearing fruit" to "abiding." Without *abiding* in the vine there can be no bearing fruit on behalf of the vine. Connection to the vine, then, is the prerequisite for any good fruit being borne. In this sense, the cross can be viewed not only with beams that extend *outward* to God (vertical) and neighbor (horizontal) but also as an intersecting crossroads drawing the vertical and horizontal edges *inward*.



Richard Rohr has spoken of the cross as the intersection of opposing forces. On the vertical side, there is heaven and earth, separated by sin and humanity's abandonment from the eternity of Eden. On the horizontal side, there are the disputes and divisions between humans, due to the serving of self-interest in the earthly realm. At the center of all of this stands Christ, suffering in the attempt to bring together and hold together that which has become separated. I'm drawn to this image of Christ as the <u>Great Connector</u>. For us to be connected to Christ – the branches on his vine – is to stand at the crossroads with him, and to bear fruit on his behalf may simply be to give witness to the reconciliation that is possible between neighbor and neighbor because of Christ's work on the cross. When it comes to reconciliation – and bringing together things that are separated – the greatest thing Jesus showed us on the cross is that this is possible. Bringing together things that are presently broken apart is – in him - always possible. Exactly how and in what fashion it will occur may not be visible to us now, and reconciliation may not mean things being exactly as they once were, but our hope in the face of things divided – by distance, by death, by sin, by pain and loss, by age or anything else – is the knowledge that standing at their crossroads is Christ, with arms outstretched to show us the possibility of their future connection.

## Your Faith in 60 Seconds

Cindy Soebbing, longtime member of the choir, former elder and chair of shepherding, offered her faith in 60 seconds this past Sunday. Here is what she said:



I have many times pondered the question of why I am a Christian and how to verbalize my reasons to others. Having been born into a Christian believing household, I always knew about God and Jesus, but it was not personal for me as a child. I remember that my mom, being very musical, would play bible songs on our stereo, and I didn't really like many of them. Then I would feel guilty because I felt that I should like them, but I really didn't. Church and worshiping God regularly were always a big part of my young life. Yet, as I grew up, I knew that I could no longer be on the shirt tails of my believing parents, but must decide if I personally believed in the Christian faith and accepted Christ as my Savior.

So my answer is: I am a Christian because as an adult, I had several times when I was at wits end and I asked God to take over and help me and (to me it was miraculous,) the situations changed so that things turned out fine. I also have had times when I tried to handle things all by myself without looking to God and things turned out very badly. I also took part in a nondenominational bible study for many years and I learned and questioned a lot about God and Christ from reading the Bible. I feel that there are so many lessons written that are so timeless and super wise in how we are to deal with Life, that it just can't be fabricated....it seems so deeply thought out that no human alone could have created it.

My faith is as much an inward feeling as it is something that I can express in words. The more I lean on God and try to follow Jesus' teachings, the more I feel that God is truly guiding me. Both my parents were in hospice before they died. I know that God supported them as they ended their earthly life and gave me strength to endure it all. I truly felt God's presence then and continue to feel His presence surrounding me each and every day.
