# Minister's Article

# The Power of Story

On <u>Monday, February 10</u> at <u>6:30 p.m.</u> we will have "<u>An Evening of Storytelling</u>" at Central. Of course, there are many ways to think of "story" and "storytelling," but used in this way, what is meant are the sharing of 5-10 minute first-person, event-based narratives. Think about when you and your friends sit around telling stories. What is shared are conversations, events, and occurrences you experienced which you want to tell others about, because they were interesting, funny, poignant, memorable, etc. It is the same in "<u>An Evening of Storytelling.</u>" We will be telling about (and listening to) some events from our lives that impacted us in a particular way. The best stories are the ones that we remember, and they are memorable precisely because they connect with our emotions. They inspire us to think or act differently. They make us *feel* something. We are affected by them in a significant way.



A story that memorably holds our attention and captivates our imagination is one in which we can find ourselves. We can identify with the story because it connects with who we are or who we want to become. To that end, the best stories follow a basic pattern or arc: Old Me... Event... New Me. The story begins with the storyteller one way. Something happens that the storyteller witnesses or experiences (conversation, relationship, occurrence), and what emerges from this is a "new" storyteller. The storyteller was changed in some way that motivates them to share that story with us. They want us to feel and experience what they did. They desire us, the audience, to be changed as we were.

I believe this was why Jesus told so many stories. One might argue his parables were his preferred method of teaching. He understood better than anyone how stories tap into our emotions and make us feel something; and that when we feel something, we are moved to action. Even today, 2,000 years later, when we read the story of the prodigal son, we don't debate the size of the father's estate or the nature of the pigpen in which the younger son landed, as much as we *feel* the grief and loss of the father, watching the younger son wander off; the shame of that younger son when he hits rock bottom; and the anger and resentment of the older brother, who believed himself to be slighted for years.

It is in that spirit that we will be telling and hearing stories on February 10 in the Connection Café. Beginning at 6:30 p.m., we will have a podium and microphone set up in the southwest corner. We'll rearrange the existing tables *(continued on page 3....)* 

and chairs for more seating and will have some drinks and snacks for refreshment, and we will have a roster of our own church member storytellers. They will be telling stories on the theme: *What I learned about myself when I took a risk and stepped outside my comfort zone.* I will emcee the event and will also add my own story – how little my 6 years of German prepared me to actually speak German when I moved to Germany! I hope you will be able to join us. We'll begin at 6:30 p.m. and wrap things up probably at 8:00 p.m. or a little later. This event is meant to coincide with our current sermon series – "Learning to Step Out of the Comfort Zone" – and helps us fulfill one of our core values: Connect with One Another. I dare say it will be impossible not to be connected to the storytellers and the other audience members there that evening, through the stories that are shared. Hope so much that you can join us.
