Minister's Article

The Night Ministry

When it comes to stepping out of the comfort zone, I experienced that often during the summer of 1997 when I worked for The Night Ministry in Chicago. The Night Ministry was started by an Episcopalian priest in the early 1980s who recognized that those walking the city sidewalks at night were different than those doing so during the daytime. His mission was to bring the love of Jesus Christ to that night-time population. By the time 1997 rolled around, the Night Ministry consisted of a bus that would make a dozen stops in different neighborhoods between 9 p.m. and 1 a.m. Each stop would last about 15-20 minutes, and in that time, a volunteer would hand out sandwiches and drinks (warm or cold depending on the season), while a "Night Minister" would offer a listening ear and prayer to anyone who might desire it and a nurse would provide some very brief medical counseling and advice. In addition to this bus ministry, four to five Night Ministers were deployed to certain neighborhoods. They would walk the streets of that area between the hours of 8 p.m. and 2 a.m. They would sit in the bars of that area or on the park benches or stand at the bus stops and talk and visit with the people on the streets at night.



The philosophy of The Night Ministry was to be the presence of God in Jesus Christ for the people on the streets at night. The sidewalks, parks, and bars of the city became the parish, the people that inhabited them the congregation. In the summer of 1997, I was an intern for The Night Ministry and assigned work alongside Father Joe in Uptown on the northside. Father Joe was not a "father" in the priestly sense of the word, but he was well over 6 feet tall and passed as the spitting image of Jerry Garcia. He had worked on the streets of Uptown for nearly a decade, and everyone knew and respected him. The title "Father Joe" was meant as a sign of respect. It was probably also due to the fact that the uniform of a Night Minister was simple. Blue jeans, a name tag, and a collared shirt - meaning a shirt resembling the collar a Roman Catholic priest wears. Father Joe described the purpose of the uniform this way: Wearing the collared shirt is a way of saying we are 'open for business.' Our job as Night Ministers is not to convert others to Christ. If that happens, wonderful, but it is to be the presence of God's love for them. It is to invite them, through our very presence in their environment, to recognize that God's love is for them.

I agreed with the Night Ministry's ministry philosophy, but I had trouble with that collared shirt! Every day, I would leave the middle-class, highly educated, manicured parks, and clean streets of my Hyde Park south-side neighborhood and drive 30 minutes north – to a place that didn't look like where I lived; where the people didn't look like me or do the things in their free time that I did. I would spend six hours four nights a week, drinking orange juice and shooting darts at Mike's Place or Carol's Pub and linger around the corner of Clark and Wilson... the only one wearing a collared shirt! That shirt symbolized my feelings of vulnerability – as a minister-in-training, not sure of how to be a minister period, let alone a minister on the streets. I felt awkward with that shirt on – having none of the street cred of Father Joe, and mostly I felt exposed – I couldn't hide; my doubts and lack of confidence fully on display.

Every night, there was a moment, after I parked my car on Clark or Wilson, when I silently said to myself before opening the door, stepping out, and starting my shift, "Okay... ready? Let's go!" and even as I was saying those words to myself, I heard the answer coming back... NO! No, I'm not "ready," because are we ever really "ready" to embrace what is uncomfortable for us? As it turns out, I had some amazing experiences with The Night Ministry. I met people in the streets of Uptown I still remember today. That summer affirmed my desire to follow the call to ordained ministry and not further academic study. I also learned the value of what can be communicated to others by our very presence. I never conquered my feelings of inadequacy, but what I learned was that ministry is about learning to be comfortable in uncomfortable situations. We may never be "ready" to do anything God calls us to do, but that does not prevent us from stepping out of our comfort zone. The greatest growth may happen when we do.

Christcare Stitchers Celebrate Their 20th Anniversary!

February 2020 marks the 20th anniversary for the Christcare Stitchers, with Ernestine Mrozinski as leader. Six women began knitting and quilting blankets for children. Today, the group meets every Tuesday morning and is comprised of 35+ women and men of various faiths. They knit, crochet, and make quilts from fabric or fleece. In July 2004, our 1,000th blanket was blessed, and in December 2019, almost 19,000 blankets have been given to Project Linus for children in crisis. We have been blessed by the fellowship and the sharing experienced in Stitchers.
