

# Minister's Article

# Through the Lens of Home

I went home last weekend. A funeral beckoned. The pastor of my home church passed away. Mr. Fuller had served at Memorial Christian Church for 40 years. He dedicated me as an infant; baptized me as a teenager; used his contacts to help me get a job as an overseas missionary after college; encouraged me to attend his alma mater, the University of Chicago; spoke words at my father's funeral; and gave the pastoral prayer at my ordination. I simply cannot tell the story of my life without speaking about him.



The memorial service last weekend was followed by a long reception. There was no other "visitation." Both events, therefore, were great reunions. Mr. Fuller had mentored 20 people into the ministry, and many of those ministers were in attendance. So were a generation of kids and youth with whom I grew up, all of us now in our late 40s to late 50s. Our youth leaders and Sunday school teachers were there, too, many of them now in their 70s and 80s. My kindergarten teacher, Mrs. Ballard, was even there! The conversations were frantic and endless, accompanied by loud laughter and tearful hugs, as people were scrambling to check in with each other and attempted to cover 30 years' worth of activity over a plate of finger food.

Funerals are paradoxical in that way. They are simultaneously sorrowful, in that the occasion that brings people together is one of loss and deep sadness, and yet there is joy at rekindling the relationships that were the bedrock of vibrant community. So it was last Saturday. Though the service was bracketed by raucous laughter and loud conversation, during the worship itself, more than a few voices cracked when speaking about Mr. Fuller's impact on the world. As I reflected on that day on my drive back to Decatur, it strikes me that going home, itself, is paradoxical. For it is our "home" community – the one that raised us – that knew us before the world did, and probably knows the "real" us best. When Jesus went to his hometown (Mark 6), the townspeople were more than a bit amazed that Jesus became who he did. They remembered him when he was the son of a carpenter. When I was "home" last weekend, among that crowd that watched me grow up, no one reminded me of any past "mistakes" I

might have made, and yet I was aware that they knew me for the silliness and immaturity I might have displayed during my years among them; but on the other hand, the hometown community also knows the promise we held within us years ago and the potential we had to become someone special; and they are the ones who are most proud to hear and learn of how far we have come since we left them. I definitely felt that more than once at the reunion taking place after Mr. Fuller's service, especially in the squeeze Mrs. Ballard gave me.



So it is with our faith. By nature, to be a believer is to be both saint and sinner at the same time. We are simultaneously sinners (broken human beings living in a world marred by the Fall) and saints (redeemed by a Christ who assures us though we are *in* the world we are not *of* the world). It is during the season of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes with Maundy Thursday, that this "saint-sinner paradox" is revealed like at no other time in the year. On our journey with Jesus to the cross, we are reminded of our culpability in the demise of Christ. With Judas we betray. With Peter, we deny. With the rest of the 12, we run away and desert; and yet, we are also reminded that we matter; that the gift of sacrifice and salvation is for us — even in the midst of our cooperation in the crucifixion.

To live in a state of paradox - to be humbled by the reality of death and inspired by the power of community to sustain us through it; to be confronted by our sinful tendencies, yet comforted by a love that is not threatened by them, is sometimes awkward and at other times painful and difficult; but as I think back on last week, and forward to the rest of the Lenten season that awaits, there is no place I would rather stand.
