Acceptable caps/lids:

Medicine bottle, milk jug, creamer, detergent, hair spray, toothpaste, deodorant, applesauce pouch, drink bottles, flip-tops, spout caps, spray paint, ointment, baby food, shampoo, conditioner, cottage mayo, cheese, yogurt, peanut butter, ice cream (smaller than 8"), whipped topping, Pringles, coffee, butter, cream cheese, spice

Not acceptable:

Metal, trash, prescription bottles, Ziplock type bags, trigger sprayers, fast food drink lids, paper, human or animal medical supplies, food containers, cardboard liners, soap pumps, lotion pumps, grocery bags, K-cups, straws, plastic that is NOT a cap or lid, plastic pieces or parts, caps or lids with (1), (3), (6), or (7).

The How and the What...

This past Sunday our focus was "One Mission." Though much has changed in this pandemic year of 2020, what remains <u>un</u>-changed for us as a congregation is that we are *one* family, proclaiming *one* faith and called to *one* mission. I spent the sermon portion of Sunday's worship talking how this is about creating space where we – as a community – can see together that vision that God has for us, and that this vision is based on finding the place where our gifts meet the needs of the wider world around us. This intersection of gift and need is, according to Frederick Buechner, where the Kingdom of God resides.

Any mission two components. The first involves the what. What are we going to do? As people of faith, we prefer to think in terms of calling and so the question can then be phrased: what is it that we are *called* to do? This is where our minds first go when the question involves mission. *What* will we do? But the second component is every bit as important, and that involves *how*. *How* will we do whatever it is that we are called to do.



In a few weeks, we will have a presidential election. We will go to the polls and make our selection (if we haven't already done so by mail). This is *what* we will do, but far more important to me is *how* we decide to live in the world we create by *what*-ever decision is made in this, or any other election, because we are in danger of losing a sense of civility that is so necessary for healthy and vital societies.

Civility comes from the Latin *civitas*, meaning "relating to the citizens." Going back to ancient Rome, it has further implied how citizens *should* relate to one another. Civility is, in this way, about extending dignity and respect to one another; courtesy, kindness and decency. It is about demanding these things *of* ourselves just as much as we demand them *for* ourselves, but we seem to have lost that. We instead demand what we are unwilling to extend. We act as though empathy and compassion are bad words, and that things like courtesy and kindness are signs of weakness. Far more important to me than *what* the outcome of the presidential election is, *how* are we going to change the way we relate to each other? Because it must be changed. Jesus said (in speaking to his disciples), "You know that among the gentiles, those whom they recognize as their leaders lord it over them. And that their great ones are tyrants over them. But it must not be so with you" (Mark 10:42-43). In other words, you are called to offer an alternative to the world by *how* you live in the world.

It is unfortunate to me that our world is becoming increasingly binary. There is "this" or there is "that." There is either "right" or "wrong," "good" or "bad," black or white (literally and figuratively). You're with me or against me. This is a zero-sum world of our own creation in which you either "win" or you "lose." Our national leaders don't seem inclined to change this trend. Neither news outlets nor social media platforms do either. And yet, the most meaningful things in life – the ones that are truly life-giving, and which bring peace and reconciliation, are rarely so rigidly binary. People, circumstances, events, relationships cannot be so easily compartmentalized into one of a two options. We are far more complex than that.

And so is God. God's presence is forever found in the area between life and death, saint and sinner, cross and empty tomb, human and divine, body and spirit. God is never afraid to dwell in the midst of our complexities, and so regardless of what the outcome of the upcoming election is, I hope that we – as a church – are not afraid to dwell there either. This is how I hope we choose to live... after we make our choice on November third.

On <u>Sunday</u>, <u>October 25</u>, we will offer our first gathering of *Sharing the Journey*, a small group focused on spiritual growth. This ministry is about creating community and offering opportunities for people to offer care and concern for one another. It's about living a fuller life of faith. This small group will meet virtually, on the <u>Zoom platform</u>, on Sunday evenings from <u>6:30-7:30</u>, starting on <u>October 25</u>, and going through November 22. - Share prayer concerns and joys, and close with prayer.

The focus and the goal is for spiritual growth, spiritual deepening, learning how to live in community, one with another, to be more vulnerable in our faith, more intimate with what we share and what we hear from one another, and ultimately to say, "To what degree does this look like the realm of God?"
