**Good Coaching**

*This fall, I have been attending an online class sponsored by our region (the Christian Church in Illinois and Wisconsin) on coaching. The class is offered through Coach Approach Ministries and is a wonderful complement to other "helping" techniques – such as spiritual direction, counseling, family systems theory, and clinical pastoral education – with which I am already familiar. Moreover, it is the first "formal" educational experience I have had in this area in a long time and has been very informative. As part of the class, each of the students is expected to write a blog post for the CCIW Coaches Facebook page. My turn fell this week and I share my submission with you here.*

Like many people who played athletics growing up, or who have watched from the sidelines as their children played sports of their own, I have witnessed plenty of bad coaching. As a high school footballer, I remember being forced to run around the track with my teammates after practice, relentlessly chanting the phrase "Winners never quit, quitters never win" (as though this drumbeat-ed mantra would somehow steel us into tougher versions of ourselves). Years later I watched as my son's 8-year-old baseball team was forced to "run to the tree and back" because the players were making too many errors (as though running – and not actually practicing the lacking skills – would somehow make those desired abilities materialize). Through it all, however, I must confess that I have carried a bit of a bias that a "good" coach should have experience doing the very thing they are coaching. That is, to coach the game you must have played the game.

Not only is this not the truth, it is far from the truth. Michael Lewis (author of [Moneyball](#) and [The Big Short](#)) has a podcast I highly recommend called [Against the Rules](#). Season two focuses on coaching, and episode three of that season involves Timothy Gallwey. Gallwey wrote the best-selling book [The Inner Game of Tennis](#) (1974) in which he maintained that anyone can learn to play tennis, regardless of experience or ability, by silencing the voices in their head. The episode features an interview with Gallwey today, who tells the story of being invited to "coach" the Houston Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra. He admitted to knowing absolutely nothing about music, but accepted the invitation nonetheless. In front of the entire orchestra, he asked a tuba player, "What do you find most difficult about your personal performance?" The tubist answered, "Articulation in the upper range." Gallwey confessed again that he had no comprehension of the meaning of that sentence, but he had the tubist play something. It sounded perfect to Gallwey. The tubist however was not impressed. Gallwey then asked, "How would you know if you played it well?" The tubist replied, "I would feel it in my tongue." "What if," Gallwey suggested, "you focused not on what you were hearing but on your tongue." The tubist then played the same portion of music. When he was done, he smiled broadly and the entire orchestra gave him an ovation.

Coaching is not about having expertise in the particular area of interest of the person being coached. In fact, such expertise might get in the way of good coaching. Coaching is rather about asking the kinds of questions which focus on the person being coached. Notice in the three questions Gallwey asked, the focus is on "you." You, the tuba player. Coaching is not about what the coach

knows, but about the coach creating the space in which a person is able to discover for themselves the answers to their questions and solutions to their problems.

Income fluctuates due to the weather, as it affects price and yield, and income from the farm is restricted to use for capital projects.
