## **PRAYER FOCUS**

Lord of my heart, **give me wisdom** to direct me, that thinking or acting, I may always discern right from wrong.

# **SCRIPTURE FOCUS**

1 Corinthians 1:18-21 (NRSV)

For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written:

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise;

the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate."

Where is the wise person? Where is the teacher of the law? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe.

#### MAIN IDEA

**Wisdom, in the scriptures, is often portrayed as being 'counter-cultural'.** The Beatitudes, and indeed the entirety of the Sermon on the Mount, becomes an exposition of the counter-cultural wisdom of the Kingdom of God. How do we know, though, when we are adopting a spiritual wisdom born of God, or adopting a wisdom that is part of the culture is which we live and might be in opposition to the wisdom of God? How do we know the difference?

# **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

- ⇒ How do you determine the basis for what you think is right? Are you sure you are not 'kicking against the goads'? (Acts 26:14)
- ⇒ In these days of unprecedented change, how do we know the difference between change that is moving us forward in a helpful, healthy manner and that which is not?
- ⇒ In what ways do you see the wisdom of Jesus and the kingdom of God as 'counter-cultural' today?
- ⇒ In one year, two years, five years, ten years, as we look back upon this time, what do you think we will be able to see, in retrospect, that we cannot see now? How much will our perception be shaped by the wisdom of a later time?
